R2.2 Teacher training curriculum

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Introduction

The curriculum development methodology emphasizes a structured approach, starting with a thorough needs analysis to identify educational gaps through surveys and focus groups involving educators, students, and parents. This stage ensures alignment with European Micro-credential standards and local educational requirements.

The next phase, curriculum framework design, focuses on defining clear learning objectives for each module and organizing content logically, from understanding diverse classroom needs to applying innovative teaching methods.

The methodological approach is grounded in key competences such as cultural competency, emotional intelligence, conflict resolution, and innovative pedagogy. It adheres to principles of student-centered learning, inclusivity, diversity, parental and community engagement, and continuous professional development.

Objectives of the curriculum:

- Enhance teacher competence: Develop teachers' abilities to create inclusive and supportive learning environments that cater to diverse student needs.
- Promote mental health and well-being: Equip educators with the skills to support students' mental health and well-being, contributing to a positive school climate.
- Innovative teaching methods: Introduce and explore innovative teaching methods that ignite student curiosity and foster a love for learning.
- Strengthen relationships: Foster strong relationships between teachers, students, and parents to create a collaborative and supportive educational community.
- Early intervention: Implement early warning systems and evidence-based strategies to identify and support at-risk students promptly.

Program structure:

Background and knowledge base

- **Germany:** Germany focuses on full-day schooling programs, vocational education and training (VET), educational counseling, school social work, and flexible learning pathways. The German education system has implemented various initiatives to support at-risk students, emphasizing the importance of personalized interventions and vocational training.
- **Spain:** Spain has made significant progress in reducing ESL rates through scholarships, special education grants, transportation support, and reinforcement programs. Regional differences persist, with autonomous communities like Andalusia implementing targeted programs to address high dropout rates.
- **Norway:** Norway's Completion Reform addresses mental health issues, stress culture, and performance expectations. The government has introduced mentoring schemes, follow-up obligations for students with high absenteeism, and systematic preventive measures to reduce dropout rates.
- **Romania:** Romania faces challenges related to quality and equity in education, with high ESL rates in rural areas. Initiatives include inclusive education programs, school reintegration efforts, and the implementation of the Early Warning Mechanism in Education to identify and support at-risk students early.
- **Bulgaria:** Bulgaria's strategy includes a coordination mechanism to tackle ESL, focusing on enhancing educational attainment and stakeholder engagement. The country addresses regional disparities through targeted programs and emphasizes the importance of teacher training and support.

Holistic ESL prevention knowledge and skills for personalizing learning experiences

OVERVIEW

- A better state of mental health and overall wellbeing in students can lead to improvements in academic performance, as students will be more focused and motivated to learn.



How to involve students in the learning game


